

Please join us for dinner and worship on Ash Wednesday



Sunday Adult Bible Class – The Book of Joshua

Why Do We Give to Church?

My friends, one of the things that the leaders of St. Mark's and I would like to focus on this year is the financial health of our congregation. As you may know, if all things stay the same, we are projecting a somewhat significant shortfall this year between contributions and expenses. Therefore, the leaders and I have put together a plan to help move us toward a more financially sustainable position, as we also seek to address some other specific long-term challenges. We pray God's gracious blessing upon our efforts and upon the life and work of His Church!

In light of this, I would like to take this opportunity to discuss the topic of Christian giving. Now, I know this can be a sensitive subject. Any time the words "money" or "giving" or "stewardship" echo within the Church, it can leave many squirming in their seats. "Oh boy," some might think, "here it comes. Pastor's going to tell us we need to give more. As if I don't already have a million other things to do with my money!" Indeed, the world today often accuses the Church of being nothing more than a money-making scheme. Nevertheless, the Scriptures speak about Christian giving, and the Church must as well.

But before I go any further, I would like to acknowledge that Christian giving does involve much more than money. As we say, it also involves us giving of our time, of our talents, and of our personal energy and efforts. In fact, the Scriptures speak of us presenting even our very bodies as living sacrifices to God (Romans 12:1). However, for my purposes here, I would like to focus specifically on the financial facet of Christian giving, understanding that the principles here do apply more broadly to all types of Christian giving.

Now, as it relates to Christian giving, there's a lot that we could say. We could talk about how much we should give. We could talk about the manner in which we should give. We could talk about how to give wisely. However, here I'd like to get to the heart of the matter and consider a different question. I'd like to consider *why it is that we give*. In other words, when we bring our offerings to church and drop them into the plate, what should be our motivation? Why do we do it? This is the question I'd like to consider. And to answer this question, allow me now to lay out three Scriptural points.

First, *we give because we love the Gospel*. The Gospel, my friends, is the joyous message of salvation in Christ. It's the good news that Jesus "was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification" (Romans 4:25). It's the proclamation of "repentance and forgiveness of sins" in

His name (Luke 24:47), the precious announcement that all who believe in Him "will not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). This is the Gospel.

And we give our offerings to Church, first and foremost, because we love that Gospel and we want it to be proclaimed in our community for years to come. By that Gospel, God saves us. And by that Gospel, God saves this world. As Paul says, "it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes" (Romans 1:16). And so we want the world to hear it. We want our children to hear it. We want our neighbors and our friends to hear it. We want them all to hear it so that, believing in Him, they too might escape the "day of wrath" (Romans 2:5) and join us in God's eternal kingdom (Matthew 25:34). As Christians, we love the Gospel. And we give to Church so that, by our tithes and offerings, its proclamation might endure.

But, even more, *we give because we are thankful*. Truly, God has blessed us in so many ways. On account of our sins, we deserve only punishment. But what does God do? He, in His amazing love, graciously pours down upon us blessing after blessing, both for this life and for the life to come. He gives us our homes. He gives us our jobs. He gives us our clothing and our shoes. He gives us our talents and our abilities and our health and our strength. He makes the sun to shine upon us and gives us the rain in its season. And then on top of all that, He gives us, through faith, His everlasting salvation. All of these blessings, God pours down upon us both daily and richly through Christ.

And so we give to Church to say thanks to God. We give to Church because we recognize all that God's done for us and we want to give back to Him. Just as the ancient Israelites were commanded to bring the "best of the firstfruits" of their fields to the Lord (Exodus 23:19), so also we, in the freedom of the Gospel, give the firstfruits of our labor to God. It is an act of gratitude and appreciation. We give to Church to say thanks.

And, finally, *we give because we are free*. As Christians, we can be sure that God will take care of us and provide for all of our needs. In Christ, we have been reconciled to Him. Our relationship with God has been restored. We are at peace with Him (Romans 5:1). In our baptisms, God has made us His beloved children. Therefore, we can count on Him. He will provide for all our needs, without fail. As Paul assures us, "my God will supply every need of yours according to His riches in glory in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:19). In other words, our

We hope you will participate in our Lenten Stewardship Pledge Drive

As you may know, we are currently projecting a financial shortfall of around \$20,000 for St. Mark's for this year. Therefore, the congregational leaders have put together a plan to help ensure, with God's blessing, that we can get back to a sustainable financial situation, in order that the Gospel might continue to be preached here for years to come. As part of this plan, we will be holding a Stewardship Pledge Drive during the season of Lent.

Here, congregational members and families are asked to prayerfully consider their personal resources and to make a pledge to increase their regular offerings according to their ability. Pledge forms will be mailed out to member households in early February. Completed forms should be returned during the season of Lent (February 26-March 29). A box will be provided on the back table of the sanctuary for completed forms, along with envelopes to seal the forms. All forms will remain confidential and will not be opened or viewed. During the Divine Service on Sunday, March 29, these pledges will be presented to the Lord with prayer and thanksgiving.

Please join us in this pledge drive! The Church Council has worked very hard to trim the budget for this year and the Lord has been blessing us with new members. But at the same time, we all have to work together and do our part, according to our ability, to address this financial shortfall for the sake of the Gospel. Can we count on you?

God, who knows "what [we] need before we ask Him" (Matthew 6:6), will take care of us perfectly.

And what does that mean? It means we are free to be generous, as God desires. We don't need to hoard our money, like the rich fool from Jesus' parable (Luke 12:13-21). Our money doesn't save us. Rather, as Christians we are free to follow Christ's example in sacrificing for the sake of others. Our giving to Church is an opportunity to live out this freedom in trust toward God. As Jesus promises, "Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (Matthew 6:33).

So, my friends, give. When that offering plate comes around, do your part, as God has granted you the ability. Give because you love the Gospel. Give because you are thankful. Give because you are free. God has equipped each of us differently. So let us work together, each according to our circumstances, to support our congregation, remembering always the words of Christ, that "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).
