Pastor's Page

The Joy of Wisdom: Proclaiming Christ in the Noisy Streets

My friends, we find ourselves today surrounded by a seemingly endless number of philosophies, worldviews, and religions, each one competing vigorously for our allegiance. We hear them preached through popular movies and TV shows, they ring out subtly in our music, they fill the editorial pages of major newspapers and flash before us on social media. A million different ideas, held by a million different people, pulling us in a million different directions. Ideas about God. Ideas about humanity. Ideas about right and wrong, and about life and death. There seems to be no end to them, and they're all calling out to us, seeking somehow to lure us in.

Therefore, we Christians must ask: In such a world of intellectual and religious diversity, what is the role of the Church? What does it mean to follow Christ in the midst of so many different opinions? Or, better yet, how does Jesus our Lord address this many-minded world?

Well, to answer this question, we can turn to the book of Proverbs, Chapter 1, where we find a beautiful picture of the work of Christ and His Church: "Wisdom cries aloud in the street, in the markets she raises her voice; at the head of the noisy streets she cries out; at the entrance of the city gate she speaks: 'How long, O simple ones, will you love being simple? How long will scoffers delight in their scoffing and fools hate knowledge? If you turn at my reproof, behold, I will pour out my spirit on you; I will make my words known to you... For the simple are killed by their turning away, and the complacency of fools destroys them; but whoever listens to me will dwell secure and will be at ease, without dread of disaster" (Proverbs 1:20-23, 32-33).

Here, the unbelieving world is depicted as a noisy marketplace, where at every step someone else is trying to sell you their own ideas. You can easily picture it. There you are, walking along a dusty road, jostled here and there by a busy crowd, passing booth after booth, the noise of innumerable merchants rising up above the din. On your right hand you pass the Muslims, who cry out after you, saying that you must submit to Allah and to Muhammed as his prophet. Meanwhile, you pass on your left hand the Jews, who say that if you want God's favor you must keep the Law. A little way down you pass the Atheists, who tell you that in fact there is no God, and then the Agnostics, who reply that we just can't know. And on and on and on it goes, as you then pass the Materialists and the Secularists, the Radical Feminists and the LGBTQ Alliance, the Buddhists and the Hindus and the Wiccans and the Universalists. As you walk by, each one cries out to you from their particular booth,

trying to convince you to stop in and buy what they're selling. Indeed, this is the unbelieving world: a noisy marketplace of a million disparate voices.

But here's the thing: none of these voices can save. They will all in the end bring hopelessness and ruin, for each one is selling a false god and a false religion. We can see the truth of this in the world around us. The creed of the Materialists, for instance, brings ultimately a life of meaninglessness, for they tell us there is nothing at all beyond the physical. The creed of the LGBTO Alliance, alternately, brings chaos, for they tell us that we are defined not by objective biology but by our own inner feelings. Likewise, the creed of the Atheists brings despair, the creed of the Muslims and Jews brings fear and uncertainty, and the creed of the Universalists brings injustice. Out of the million voices, every one falls short of the truth, embedding us in falsehood and, therefore, in death. What they are selling will in the end cost us everything. As it says in the book of Proverbs, "For the simple are killed by their turning away, and the complacency of fools destroys them" (Proverbs 1:32).

But above all the noise of the busy marketplace we then hear another voice, the voice of Christ, who is Wisdom incarnate. He stands at the head of the noisy streets and proclaims a message unlike anything else that we hear around us, a message of salvation for sinful man by the grace of God alone. It's a message which fills our lives with meaning and hope and which brings us true rest, peace, joy, and life. "I love you and I have fully accomplished your salvation," Jesus says. "I have died for your sins and I have risen for your justification. There's nothing left for you to do. I have done it all. Come to me and live." It is the voice of Wisdom, vindicated publicly in His resurrection from the dead: "Whoever listens to me will dwell secure and will be at ease, without dread of disaster" (Proverbs 1:33).

And this, my friends, is what it means to be the Church in this world of intellectual and religious diversity. We are those saved through faith in Christ, those who have, by the grace of God, turned to wisdom from folly. And our role now is to stand at the head of the street with Christ and cry, "How long, O simple ones, will you love being simple?" That is to say, our role in this world is to proclaim the truth of Jesus—loudly—so that it resounds above the noisy streets and people come to hear it. Yeah, Christ's message does exclude and condemn the many ideas being peddled in the marketplace, and therefore provokes the world's wrath. But if the Church had remained silent in the past, how would we ourselves have heard? In the

Harrison elected to 4th term as LCMS president

The Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison, having received 51.76 percent of the votes cast, is the president-elect of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) for a fourth term of office, 2019–2022

The resulting candidates for the office of president were the three ordained ministers who received the highest number of votes in the nominations process and who consented to serve if elected. The three nominees for Synod president were Harrison; the Rev. Dr. David P.E. Maier, president of the LCMS Michigan District; and the Rev. Timothy M. Klinkenberg, senior pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, Orange, Calif.

The results of the ballot tallied and reported to the secretary of the Synod by Election-America are as follows:

- Harrison was voted president-elect with 3,014 votes (51.76 percent);
- Maier received 2,323 votes (39.89 percent); and
- Klinkenberg received 486 votes (8.35 percent).

So cry out, people of God. Let the world hear. This doesn't mean that you need to be a literal street-corner preacher. Rather it means building relationships with those in your daily vocations and seeking opportunities to proclaim Jesus to them in a loving and respectful way. Listen to them. Understand them. Serve them. And, when the time comes, share Jesus with them. Don't be ashamed. Let your voice be heard. And as you preach the Word, know this: It is truly Christ speaking through you, pouring out upon this world true Wisdom, calling all sinners to repentance, and freely offering them His glorious salvation—as He will do until the End comes and the fullness of God's Church is gathered before His One Almighty Voice.

Parsonage Committee Report per John Reardon

Reminder of the motion made and approved at the Semiannual Voters' Meeting on December 2, 2018:

To give the Parsonage Committee permission to spend up to \$8,500 in order to get the back, assessed 1-acre lot prepared for sale, and to put it up for sale, in order to support the purchase of a parsonage, or another neighborhood outreach project, at a later date. Proceeds from the sale shall be placed into a "Neighborhood Outreach Fund" (which could include a parsonage).

Parsonage Committee Update – cost to build a parsonage is too much. Maybe a family park on the back acreage instead of selling the 1-acre lot? Per the township, a site plan would be needed for ANY property improvements or additions including a playground. This would open the door for the township to demand we make other improvements, e.g. possibly install a sidewalk along Commerce Road, sidewalk along Bywater, islands with curbs and flowers in our parking lot, etc. Committee will be researching options we can do along our back property (along Bywater Ave.) that will still help connect us better to our neighborhood, but not require a site plan or permits.

Mandy made a motion to adjourn at 11:44 a.m., Larry seconded. Motion carried.
